DSP HONOR GUARD by Sgt Rob Hartson

The unofficial DSP Honor Guard Unit (HGU) began its existence in the mid 80's in then District 3, the Fond du Lac Post. Under the approval of Captain Bill De Guire, Trooper Roger Jones selected a core group of dedicated individuals that trained and performed on very short notice. The primary duties consisted of funeral detail venues. The group saw changes over the years but remained status quo. Primary members and the driving force to continue the details were Troopers Jeff Liethen and Jim Reese. Some years later, there was a resurgence in the need for trained Honor Guard members. The Academy hosted two training sessions with members from around the State to form one statewide group. The initiative, while important and successful, did not fully function properly. In 2003, Sergeant Jeff Liethen assumed the duties as the statewide coordinator of the Honor Guard. A regimented training and selection process was conducted once again at the Academy under the supervision of Liethen, Reese, and other keys members including Sgt. Doug Tuttle from the Sheboygan Co. Sheriff's Department. The new face of the HGU took shape. In 2010, the unit saw a change of command, when Sergeant Rob Hartson assumed the duties as primary statewide coordinator. In 2012, the unit was slightly revamped once again and continues with that look today.

Training for the Unit has varied over the years. Some members have attended formal training, like the Washington, D.C., Metropolitan Police Department Honor Guard School and the Wisconsin Honor Guard Association Basic Training. Others have obtained basic training from their military experience. Still others have received training in-house at Honor Guard in-service training sessions at the Academy. Currently, the HGU schedules four training sessions throughout the year that take place at the Academy. Training at these sessions include basic drill and ceremony, flags and rifles, parade formations, and casket postings. Training sessions are usually 8 hours in length, broken into two days allowing for travel time to and from the Academy.

Today, the Honor Guard Unit is 28 members strong with representation in each Region of the State. The main purpose of the HGU is to represent the DSP in ceremonial events. The HGU is an excellent public relations tool that shows exactly what the State Patrol is all about: honor, respect, and excellence as a premiere law enforcement agency.

The events are chosen, in large part, by what gives the DSP the greatest exposure. Functions such as agency conferences, highway openings, law enforcement graduations, parades, sporting events, and law enforcement memorial ceremonies are some of the details to which the HGU has been assigned. Some of the more notable events include: The Wisconsin Law Enforcement Memorial Sunrise Guard Mount and Ceremony, The Law Enforcement Memorial Ceremony in Washington, D.C., The Association of American Motor Vehicle Administrators Conference, The National Governor's Association Conference (August 2013), Flag Day Parades, Milwaukee Bucks and Brewer's games, and numerous other outside agency events, as well as DSP and outside agency funerals.

In 2012, the HGU has made some significant accomplishments in several areas. These areas include: more frequent training opportunities, regional out-of state representation at line-of-duty death funerals, the procurement of DSP's own agency flag (furnished by a donation from the Wisconsin Troopers Association), as well as participating in 30 details throughout the State in 2012.

Goals for the future include: continued and more regular training, new member recruitment, new uniforms, additional equipment, continued and expanded representation of the DSP by the Honor Guard at out-of-state line of duty deaths, a rifle and casket team, and the establishment of HGU Policy and Procedure guidelines.

The future of the DSP Honor Guard Unit is bright. As exposure to the public grows, more requests come in from outside agencies and entities. These agencies see the pride, respect, and honor put forth by the Honor Guard Unit and want that displayed at their events. The members of the HGU are proud to serve in this capacity, representing the DSP and all that it stands for in Wisconsin.



WHERE ARE THEY NOW by Bruce Bishop

There are several instances where fathers and sons have made the State Patrol their careers. But in Cumberland, where Trooper Tim Heffernan spent the majority of his service, residents and friends joked that for the Heffernan family, the State Patrol was the family business.

Born eighty years ago in Cumberland, Tim graduated from high school, worked on small farms before becoming a Standard Oil delivery route man and from there becoming a State Trooper. He graduated with Academy 6th Recruit class in August of 1957 and was assigned WSP #273. His first assignment was in District #1 in Madison followed by District #5 in Medford. He settled in for the rest of his career in Cumberland where he and Carole, his wife of 48 years, took over the old Heffernan family farm. They updated the farm to accommodate themselves and proceeded to raise seven children, (six daughters and one son). Tim retired in July 1993 after 36 years of service.

But that wasn't the last of Heffernan Troopers. Thirty years after his Dad's graduation, son John, was a member of the 38th Recruit Class. He is WSP number #2082 and is currently a Sergeant on the Academy staff. Not to be outdone, daughter Mary graduated with 40th Recruit Class in November 1990 with WPS #2114. She recently retired after 22 years of service that included assignments in St. Croix and Pierce Counties, then to the Hudson Scale.

Tim has always been active in Cumberland community activities and in the Barron County Fair serving first as a volunteer and now in retirement as the full time Fair Manager. As a charter member of WSPAA, Tim serves on the Advisory Board and is also the Regional Representative for the Northwest Region. He and Carole enjoy hobby farming and being Grandparents to 16 grandchildren and 1 great-grandchild.

Tim marks his years on the road as being fulfilling and uncomplicated, made that way by good assignments, great associates, and working for reasonable and understanding supervisors.

We also chatted with John and Mary to get a little insight into what it was like to be a Trooper's child in a small town. Here are a few of their comments:

What was it like growing up as a policeman's daughter in a city of 2,000? OR: MARY: First of all in Cumberland, with seven kids, the State Patrol was considered a family business and we loved it. Dad was looked up to in the community and we were well aware of that recognition. It made us proud. QR: Do you think your Dad really liked his job? JOHN: All I know is we never heard him say he didn't want to go to work today. QR: Was Tim a tolerant and understanding father or a "toe the line or else" type? JOHN: Not in the least, he gave us lots of rope, but we never knew where the end of it was. Along those lines, did that affect your behavior and make you careful not to sully the family OR: name as teenagers might carelessly do?

JOHN & MARY: We never gave it a thought. We were raised to respect the laws and social morals.

We just weighed things in those family values. Tim, happening to be a Trooper, was just an extension of that.

- QR: Did your Dad push you into becoming State Troopers.
- JOHN & MARY: Not really, but his satisfaction with the job made it an easy choice. John knew from the time he was a teenager that he wanted to be in some type of law enforcement; state, county or local. His Dad's guidance, not Tim's insistence, caused him to choose the State Patrol . Mary's story is much the same backed up by the fact that her husband, James Sanders, is a St. Croix County Sherriff's Deputy.

Over 6,000 northbound heavy trucks pass this weigh station daily on average, about 22 percent of total northbound traffic.

The LaPrairie SWEF located near Beloit is the newest SWEF and has the latest in technology and an enclosed two lane inspection bay. Sergeant Eric Beine will give us a tour of the facility and explain new techniques for overseeing truck and public carrier enforcement.

The weigh station's spacious inspection garage has two inspection bays with pits that allow inspectors to walk under the truck's entire length.
