STATE PATROL CHEMICAL TEST SECTION By Susan Hackworthy, Section Chief

The Wisconsin State Patrol Chemical Test Section is nationally recognized as a leader in forensic breath alcohol testing with active participation on the Scientific Working Group for Toxicology (SWGTOX) developing national standards for breath alcohol programs, National Safety Council's Committee on Alcohol and other Drugs, and the International Association for Chemical Testing.

The Breath Alcohol Testing Program began in 1955 with the Breathalyzer. Wisconsin was one of the first states to utilize the breathalyzer and the section worked closely with its inventor, Dr. Robert Borkenstein, in its early stages. The program grew from 6 Breathalyzers and 250 Troopers trained to operate them, to 230 Breathalyzers and over 5,000 law enforcement officers from agencies statewide trained to operate them.

In 1985, the Intoxilyzer 5000 replaced the older Breathalyzer. The Intoxilyzer was a computerized state of the art instrument in its time and served the State well until 1998. In 1998 the Intoximeter EC/IR was approved for use and in 2006 the EC/IR II was approved for use and is currently in use today.

The present Chemical Test Section consists of breath alcohol toxicologists who maintain and certify evidential breath alcohol testing instruments, train and certify instrument operators of evidential breath alcohol instruments as well as PBT's, and provide expert testimony in court on all scientific and technical issues.

Today, there are 241 evidential breath test instruments state wide with about 5,000 operators who hold permits to perform evidential tests for breath alcohol. The Section trains approximately 500 new operators and recertifies approximately 2,500 officers annually.

Ignition Interlock Devices (IID)

The use of ignition interlock devices (IIDs) in Wisconsin was first incorporated in 1991 Wisconsin Act 277, which included provisions for vehicle seizure, immobilization or voluntary installation after an OWI conviction. The Administrative Code for IIDs, Trans 313, was promulgated in 1993 which gave the authority for the evaluation and approval of IID's to the Chemical Test Section.

2009 Act 100, which went into effect on July 1, 2010, eliminated provisions for vehicle seizure and immobilization and made IID installation mandatory for all repeat OWIs, all refusals and all 1st offense OWI with an alcohol concentration of 0.15 or higher. Since July of 2010, there have been over 34,000 OWI convictions where an IID has been ordered. At the present time, there are four Ignition Interlock Devices approved for use by the Chemical Test Section with evaluations of new devices ongoing.

WSPAA TOURS THE BELOIT SCALE By Lucy Harvey

On July 10, 2013, WSP Sergeant Eric Beine provided the WSPAA group with a tour of the new Beloit Safety and Weight Enforcement Facility. More than 6,000 heavy trucks travel north past the SWEF every 24 hours.

This structure is equipped with the latest technology for weighing and inspecting trucks. In addition to trucks that are brought onto the outdoor scale, trucks passing by are computer monitored. The "SWEF" has the latest in fixed indoor computers, bays with pits that allow inspectors to walk underneath the full length of the vehicle being inspected, and rollers that evaluate the performance of the truck's brakes. Also, Inspectors often carrying portable scales to double-check trucks that may be avoiding the SWEF. In addition to working the scales, Inspectors spend a great deal of time going to other sites for vehicle safety inspections.

During lunch at the Road Dawg Truck Stop, we discussed the "early days" of truck enforcement as well as what's rolling down the road today. Those at the table: Lyle Bliss, Superintendent Stephen Fitzgerald, Bill Harvey, and Frank Vickerman brought a combined 147 years of law enforcement experience.

An informative time was had by all, and a follow-up tour is being arranged for area judges.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW by Bruce Bishop

CARL ZUTZ MOTORCYCLE TROOPER PIONEER

Returning home from Europe in WWII, where he served in the 14th Armored Division in some of the most bitter campaigns including the Bulge, Carl Zutz tried different careers including making sausage and working in motion picture theater systems. His real motivation however fell into the field of public safety which led him to successfully apply for the Wisconsin State Patrol, graduating with the 3rd Recruit Class in July 1956 and being assigned badge #199. His first assignment was in District 3 working as a Trooper out of Fond du lac; Conover and Brillion.

When the State Patrol decided to experiment with motorcycles in the early 60's, Zutz, always adventurous and inventive volunteered, along with Trooper Harry Englebart, to be among the first riders. Englebart, who had previous cycle riding experience, and Zutz, who had none, started out learning the techniques of motorcycle patrol, riding together; one on the State owned bike andthe other on a loner from Harley Davidson. Later Zutz was issued his own machine and other problems along with it. It required him being responsible for two vehicles, the bike and a cruiser. Also two sets of uniforms and the decision as to which vehicle to use on patrol. The weather often dictated that choice.

The cycles became familiar sights on patrol and targets for cameras as they led parades, performed public relations and enforcement duties at special motorcycle rallies and events. They provided a link between the Patrol and bikers.

With a record of no accidents, rollovers or laydowns but lots of evasive tactics, Carl took a respite from cycle duties for a short time in the 70's, when he was assigned to State Headquarters to help the Motor Vehicles Safety Division set up the Vehicle Inspection Program that involved some 54 men and formed the nucleus of what is now called the Bureau of Transportation Safety.

He finished his career as an AA4 in Madison in 1985. Carl and his wife of 64 years, Margaret, now live in Wittenberg enjoying a quiet retirement often with their children and grandchildren close by.

Carl, like many of us, likes to reminisce about the Good Old Days in the OLD PATROL and can be found close to home without the hassle of a computer and failing eye sight making him a devotee of books on tape.
