The State Patrol's 75th Anniversary will be prominently featured through an array of programs this year.

In anticipation of the State Patrol's 75th Anniversary on September 1, 2014 several initiatives to highlight the agency's illustrious history are already underway, including the following:

## EFFORTS TO DIGITALLY PRESERVE WISCONSIN STATE PATROL HISTORICAL ITEMS By Sgt David Harvey

#### **Early Considerations:**

In late 2012, the Wisconsin State Patrol was beginning preparations for the approaching 75th Anniversary of the Wisconsin State Patrol in 2014. Of the many efforts included in the preparations was one to properly organize, preserve and make available historical documents related to the history of the Wisconsin State Patrol.

## Involvement of the University of Wisconsin-Madison:

As options for the handling of Wisconsin State Patrol historical documents were being discussed, Kevin Hubbard, a member of the Wisconsin State Patrol Information Technology staff recommended reaching out to the University of Wisconsin-Madison for assistance. Kevin had previously completed coursework at the UW in the area of Digital Archiving under MA, Library and Information Studies Faculty Associate, Dorothea Salo. Ms. Salo was contacted and briefed on our agency's needs. She agreed to assign our project to a Digital Archiving Team during the approaching semester.



In February of 2013, the Digital Archiving Team met with Academy Captain Chris Newman and Bureau of Field Operations (BFO) Sergeant David Harvey on the UW campus. The team discussed the goals of the project with regards to the upcoming 75th Anniversary and beyond. The team also obtained information regarding available manpower, physical and electronic storage capabilities, available equipment and the types of historical items that were currently in the DSP collection. During the meeting it was determined that the Digital Archiving Team members would benefit from being able to personally view the historical collection housed at the Wisconsin State Patrol Academy.

#### **UW Digital Archiving Team Site Visits:**

In late February, Academy Lieutenant Jerry Voight hosted the UW Digital Archiving Team at the Academy during an onsite visit. During the day-trip, the team was able to access the historical collection housed in the attic in order to document the volume and variety of types of historical items stored there. The team spent approximately five hours sorting through the collection while making notes for their project plan.

After completing the site visit to the Academy, the team produced a project charter outlining the project description, objectives and goals.

As the digital archiving team began putting their project plan together, another site visit was arranged. This time the team traveled to the DSP Central Headquarters in Madison to have an opportunity to test the digital preservation portion of their project. The team utilized DSP staff and equipment in scanning and preserving photos and documents in an electronic format.



## Presentation of the UW Digital Archiving Project Plan:

On May 10, 2013, the Digital Archiving Project Leader presented her team's project plan to Superintendent Stephen Fitzgerald during a Wisconsin State Patrol Alumni Association meeting at Gander Mountain in DeForest, Wisconsin. The plan outlined strategies, procedures, options and available resources that the team had identified for use by the DSP. Beyond the written plan, instructional videos and a sample database was delivered by the team to the DSP.

## Putting the UW Plan Into Action:

As the 75th Anniversary of the Wisconsin State Patrol drew closer, a committee was put together consisting of DSP members to develop a commemorative 75th Anniversary book. Anniversary book committee members were each assigned topic areas for which they were to gather information on. Early in this process the committee began to gather digital photos and scanned copies of developed photos. Following the recommendations of the UW Digital Archiving Project Plan the committee determined that it would need to identify a shared location where digital items could be uploaded, and identified. To accomplish this, a dedicated SharePoint site was created in ESponder. Wisconsin Emergency Management (WEM) sponsors ESponder through a company called NC4. ESponder enables agencies across Wisconsin to better plan and coordinate events through the shared use and access to Microsoft SharePoint. The anniversary book committee put together a database in SharePoint that mimicked the database designed by the Digital Archiving Team while taking advantage of the web accessibility and security provided by ESponder. As the committed assembled electronic documents from the entire spectrum of topic areas, the items were uploaded and identified in ESponder for all committee members to utilize. In addition, a historical timeline database was created to allow committee members to record significant events and dates and to attach associated documents pertaining to DSP history. In all, over 5,000 items were uploaded for use in the 75th Anniversary Commemorative Book.



#### Moving Forward:

As the 75th Anniversary of the Wisconsin State Patrol passes, the need to preserve and identify DSP historical items continues. Part of the Digital Archiving Team's plan included the option of involving the Wisconsin Historical Society (WHS). The team cited the climate controlled storage facilities that the WHS had available as well as the ability of the WHS to properly handle the different media types that existed in the DSP collection. While photos and documents could be scanned into electronic format with relative ease, older films and negatives presented more of a challenge. On January 15, 2014, two members of the Wisconsin Historical Society traveled to the Academy with Sergeant David Harvey to review the DSP historical collection. The two WHS employees that made the trip work exclusively with records and documents from state agencies. As the WHS representatives identified the types of records contained in the collection, they also explained how the WHS would handle items from the DSP collection. What became apparent during this discussion was the critical importance of having not just the items themselves, but the story behind them. The WHS is currently working with the DOT in evaluating the process for the transfer of records/reports that are subject to disposal under their records disposal authorization (RDA) but the mixture of other historical items in the DSP collection have yet to be addressed.

## Opportunities for Assistance by Wisconsin State Patrol Alumni Association Membership:

What has been preserved to date has largely been through the gathering of digital photos and through the scanning of printed photos and documents into electronic format. This work has been done by both 75th Anniversary Committee members and by officers on temporary alternate duty. While officers on alternate duty may continue to add to the collection, the identification of the items is often a task that our officers are unable to complete. The use of ESponder for the collection of these documents allows the DSP to grant access to these items and their associated information to entities outside of the DSP; namely WSPAA members. Once access is granted through ESponder, WSPAA members may log in to the ESponder site from any computer with internet access. Within the site, the member can then view any of the documents and more importantly, add information to any of the documents. Many of the photos and documents that are in the DSP collection are of high quality but are sorely lacking in identifying information. The hope is that WSPAA members can provide the much needed detail.

## Creation of a Dedicated DSP Historical Site in ESponder:

Currently the historical items that have been preserved in electronic format reside in a DSP 75th Anniversary site in ESponder. An effort is underway to move a copy of all of the saved items into a DSP Historical site that will be dedicated exclusively to the preservation and identification of DSP historical items. WSPAA members who wish to assist in this effort will be granted access to the site by a DSP ESponder Administrator. Sergeant David Harvey will demonstrate the functionality of the new site as well as grant user permissions at an upcoming WSPAA meeting.

#### A Joint Effort:

Creating a cooperative effort between the current and former DSP members is imperative if the history of the Wisconsin State Patrol is to be properly preserved. Our agency is fortunate to have had the proud and dedicated former employees that it does. They each played a part in creating the rich history of the DSP and they can continue to play a part in the preservation of that history.

# WHERE ARE THEY NOW by Bruce Bishop

## Dick Schroeder

#### Patrol Voice and Ears for 40 Years

Dick was born in Marshfield on May 22, 1936. He was five years old when his father, Gust, moved the family to Wausau where Gust became a policeman. Five years later Gust became one of the original "police radio dispatchers" as they were called in the 40's and 50's and moved the family to Tomahawk where Dick graduated from Tomahawk High School in the Class of '54. He entered the US Air Force in 1955, as an air policeman, separating in 1959.

Gust was more than just a father to Dick. He was a mentor, encouraging him to join WSP's newly increased and upgraded communication group. Dick reported to Norv Rollins, Communication Chief, on October 1, 1959. Hired on the spot, he was assigned to the Central Communication Center, Wilson Street State Office Building in Madison. This was almost like a wedding present to him and his new bride of one month Donna Brunow, who was the daughter of the Tomahawk's Chief of Police and a former Lincoln County Sheriff.

The Schroeder's, now a family of four with daughters Dawn & Darcy, were just nicely settled in Madison and Dick in new quarters at Hill Farms State Office Building where statewide patrol operations had been moved in 1964.

That same year, radio operations were decentralized and moved to the district/regional level. A grand opportunity and easy choice presented itself to Dick and Donna to return to the north as a PCO at District 5 Head-quarters in Spooner where another daughter, Lynda, was born. In 1975, an opening at Wausau brought them even closer to home.

Double digit minus zero cold, blizzards, icy closed roads and multiple accidents, sorting out jurisdictions, warning the public and coordinating support services became routine with special problems, often unanticipated. State Patrol coordination with local and county law enforcement during the University of Wisconsin campus riots in the 60's, public demonstrations against Indian treaty rights to walleye fishing, chemical spills, weather and accident road closures and many other issues that made centralized coordination of decision making critical and especially difficult under media scrutiny to further complicate matters, there were also amusing (but sometimes near tragic) incidents. Dick tells about the time at Spooner when a mentally challenged person downed the microwave tower on Lookout Mountain, south of Rhinelander on November 4, 1971. The man was subsequently arrested and jailed in Lincoln County. In an escape attempt, he reportedly injured the jailer with a broom stick, confiscated his service weapon and shot three holes in the communications console. He was later rearrested and spent the next 5 years in prison. The damage to the tower resulted in splitting District 4 into two parts and leaving District 5 in Spooner all alone, without the intercom, the red telephone and teletype for several months, until a new tower was erected. They were able to communicate with District 6, utilizing a different frequency for registration and driver's license data.

Dick retired in May of 1999 after 40 years. He is one of the unsung heroes that daily goes to work to deal with the routine, only to find themselves immersed in the special security and emergency response problems that face today's PCOs. He has watched communication history being made and technology advanced and takes pride in the part he has played.

Dick keeps in contact through periodic visits to the Wausau post, WSPAA on line, weekly and quarterly reports and he is a regular at the NC Region breakfast meeting at 51/Q restaurant South of Merrill the second Tuesday of every month, along with invites back to the retirees get-together in Spooner.

Family, travel, Donna's church work and Dick's working part time for a Toyota dealership keep them more than busy. But it doesn't interfere with their enjoying retirement at 1329 N. 4th Ave., Wausau, WI 54401.
